4.4	Earth Day / Clean Up Our Lakes / Recycling
	August 21 – Recycling changes
	We decided to create a pamphlet for the tax mailing in January that details the recycling materials
	acceptable on one side and the information about the harm pesticide spraying/fogging does on the
	other side.
	Recycling side: Now that our recycled items are going to a different depot, there are changes in what
	is accepted:
	Notably now included are: Milk cartons, cream cartons and other waxed lined gable containers
	Ice cream container tubs; Polystyrene and Styrofoam food and drink containers; take-out coffee cups;
	bottles, containers and lids marked with recycling symbol 3, 5 or 7. This may have to do with new
	buyers being found for recycled materials. Circular Materials will be doing an extensive advertising
	campaign in early 2026, will have new signs and will do all the community education for the province.
	If we put up new signs now, it will cause confusion because they will contradict the pamphlets and
	posters that are in use now.
	Karlee said she was in touch with Reverse Logistics Systems (RLG) who directed that people should not
	be putting their recycling in the household garbage and they will direct more trucks our way to
	exchange the compactor bins as soon as they're full. If the bins are changed on time, the Township
	does not need new bins. We could also make a pdf of a list that people could print out at home. The
	pamphlet should look substantially different than the old pamphlet, using multiple colours, to help
	residents recognize it as new. The Township has blue boxes for sale. There was a big fuss on FB when
	we last advertised the blue boxes for sale.
	Pesticide side:
	Apparently Kapuskasing and Moonbeam have passed a "no spraying" bylaw under the Forestry Act
	which forbids spraying too close to drinking water sources. Jennifer to check with FOCA about other
	municipalities and whether they have bylaws against fog spraying.
	Peter and Rob will work on the pesticide part of the pamphlet and Rick, Ross and Jennifer will work on
	the recycling side.

	Island Road, Grey Owl Road and McKellar Lake Road. Those sites would suit a Reptile Crossing sign.
	However the turtles cross all along Centre Rd and Hurdville Rd and don't seem to favour one area for
	crossing. Karlee is going to look for a "Watch for Turtles" sign that would give a general warning for the
	whole road.

	going each way can see them – twice the cost – keep in mind for the budget – The FB page McKellar
	Reptile Crossings has 47 followers and has received 31 reports – there are more on iNaturalist about
	the McKellar area over the past 5 years – There are reports of turtle crossings the full length of Centre
	Rd and Hurdville Rd and some on other roads
	June 15 The campaign has received 15 reports of turtle locations – mainly painted turtles. A google
	map has been created.
