Subject: Month End Status Updates for September 2023								

For the month of Sept 2023, the Township of McKellar Fire Department responded to a total of 11 calls at the time of writing this report consisting of:

- 8 Medical calls
- 2 Fire or associated calls
- 0 Assistance calls (mutual/automatic/ or inter agency aid)
- 1 Motor Vehicle Collisions

We have now responded to 99 total calls this year.

Apparatus and Equipment:

Rescue 3 is being prepared for sale and an account with Govdeals.ca is in the process of being opened to sell the vehicle.

Carrier Emergency Vehicles conducted the yearly certification testing for our pumping vehicles as well as our ladders.

Personel:

McKellar Fire has decided to re-open the recruitment process with the intention of bringing on 2-3 more volunteer firefighters to take the place of some long term absences and attrition. Council will be kept informed and new recruits will be brought to council for approval once the appropriate background checks and interviews have been completed. Social media will be used as well as word of mouth to fill these vacancies. At this time 1 candidate has been put forward to council for acceptance

Training:

Recruits involved in the WPSRTP have completed the practical and theory portions of their FF1 training. Recruits performed admirably in the physical testing on September 17 and we anxiously await the written results. A graduation ceremony has been planned for late October. Our recruits upon receiving a passing grade from the Ontario Fire College and Marshall testers will be remunerated for their efforts as discussed. Recruits and members of the department are now free to commence FF2 training using our R1 platform to continue their learning process and improve on their skills. Eventually all McKellar responders will be introduced to FF2 when the timing is appropriate. This is all in an effort to achieve the results necessary under the new OFM standards for fire departments by July 1 2026. The whole of the McKellar department which are currently training to FF1 standards are scheduled for testing in March of next year. Other steps toward achieving this goal which McKellar is taking are:

-Training of 1 to 2 more FF's to NFPA 1041 so that they can function as instructors with signing authority under the OFM.

-December 8,9,10 We will be hosting and Ice Rescue Operations certification, with attendees from other departments likely. This will be the first time McKellar will have been fully trained and certified to provide full Ice Rescue capabilities to our township -McKellar has been a co-applicant to the acquisition of the OFM Burn Trailer for the West Parry Sound group and the Recruit Training Program. We will have the opportunity to attend the trailer for a complete day of live burns in this state of the art trailer under the supervision of the OFM. Our dates for use this year are October 19 – 23.

Buildings:

Cleanup of Stn 2 has continued with the goal of this fall having it operational as a higher quality training facility for our crews.

Home Safe Home, Fire Prevention and education:

McKellar Fire will continue to showcase fire prevention efforts and public education for smoke and co alarms. We will be also pushing Emergency Preparedness information out to the community, encouraging the creation of 72 hour kits in peoples homes in the event of an extended emergency in our area.

Chief's Notes:

With an eye to emergency preparedness we would like to look back and thank our former CEMC and Alt CEMC Chris Everitt for his efforts in these roles. With the official retirement and replacement of Chris we have begun the work of identifying a suitable replacement for him in the Alt CEMC role.

Subject: Five -year (2024-2028) Capital Budget

Recommendation:

THAT the Council of the Township of McKellar receive Report T-2023-12 for discussion and analysis.

Background:

The township's five-year capital budget has been meticulously crafted, prioritizing the capital needs of the community based on a variety of factors, including safety, regulatory requirements, operational conditions, and service level agreements. To reduce the cost of capital projects, our staff has diligently sought and applied for grant funding, which reduces the burden on reserve funds. We will continue to explore opportunities for grant funding for both current and future projects, and any additional grants received will be used to improve the reserve and reserve funds, or to reduce debt. To provide a comprehensive overview of capital projects, the accompanying schedule is organized by asset class, and provides details for each fiscal year of the five-year capital budget, based on when spending is estimated to occur. The Five-year Capital Budget includes a range of critical infrastructure projects, such as road reconstruction, bridge rehabilitation, building upgrades, and park equipment. Additionally, the budget includes funding for various equipment purchases, such as fire trucks and road maintenance vehicles, that will help maintain the community's infrastructure.

Financial Analysis/Discussion:

The proposed five-year capital budget outlines a diverse range of projects that require funding totaling *\$9,044,373.76*. These projects encompass a variety of initiatives that will improve and expand our infrastructure, enhance public safety, and promote economic growth. To finance these projects, we have recommended a mix of funding sources, including *\$1,440,583* in grants, *\$2,000,000* from tax levies, and *\$660,000* from reserve funds. The remaining amount will be either unfunded or borrowed from Infrastructure Ontario, which will allow us to complete these vital projects efficiently and effectively.

Capital Grant

- Canada Community Building Fund's five-year total \$ 367,675
- Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund's five-year total \$ 635,375
- Northern Ontario Resource Development Support Fund for Center Road \$437,533

Tax Levy Supported

• Transfer from core operation to Fund the Capital Projects five-year total *\$2,000,000*

Reserves

- To Fund the purchase of 2023 Dodge RAM Outfitted for Fire Department \$80,000 in 2024, using Fire Department Vehicle Reserve. Please note Fire chief provided two options for vehicles, one of them is 2023 Ford F550 with fire chassis and electrics for \$263,000 and other one is 2023 Dodge RAM. I have included 2023 Dodge RAM in the budget.
- To Fund the purchase of 2024 Equinox LT \$40,000 in 2025, using Building Department Reserve
- To Fund the purchase of Ford F250 \$90,000 in 2024, using Roads Capital Equipment/Vehicle Reserve
- To Fund the purchase of John Deere Backhoe \$200,000 in 2028, using Roads Capital Equipment/Vehicle Reserve
- To Fund the purchase of Ford F550 \$150,000 in 2026, using Roads Capital Equipment/Vehicle Reserve

As a project advances through its timeline, it is possible that other funding options may arise as a viable substitute for reserve or debenture financing. These alternative sources of funding can be explored as potential solutions to meet the project's financial needs.

Unfunded Capital

The five-year forecast includes unfunded capital budget of **\$4,943,790.76**. There are two options to resolve unfunded capital budget problem.

Debenture:

Many municipalities depend on debt financing as a crucial means of funding their capital needs, especially when it comes to replacing and expanding infrastructures. According to the current information, it is possible to fully accommodate the replacement and growth-related infrastructure needs of the municipality only through debt financing over the next 5 years. To cover the unfunded capital budget of **\$4,943,790.76**, new debt needs to be issued within the forecast period. The report attached herewith includes the amortization of the debenture for the full amount payable in 20 years.

Deferring Capital Projects:

The Township has an alternative solution to tackle its unfunded capital budget. By postponing non-essential projects that do not affect our services, the Township can collect the required funds in due time. This deferral of specific tasks will lead to a decrease in the amount of the unfunded capital budget. Moreover, if some projects are removed altogether, it may generate extra funds that can be allocated towards other corporate priorities or reserved. This alternative approach will enable the Township to manage its financial resources with greater efficiency.

Conclusion:

Similar to many other municipalities, the Township is confronted with an infrastructure gap, where the necessary capital expenditures for vital infrastructure projects exceed the available funding sources. This poses a challenge in meeting the essential infrastructure needs of the community. To address this gap, the Township needs to develop a comprehensive budget that prioritizes critical capital projects.

Equipment:

SCBA

McKellar will be required to replace it's existing stock of SCBA packs and equipment by the year 2028. At that point the SCBA which we currently own will no longer be certifiable for use. Two quotes have been obtained as well as information about the order which was placed by a local department last year to display the capital investment we will be required to make.

A quote was requested for 15 SCBA, 15 face masks and 30 cylinders from 2 different sources.

The Cadillac: AJ Stone – 15 MSA G1 scba w/ 15 facemasks and 30 (60 min) cylinders. \$ 255,250.05

The Minimum: CSE – 15 Interspiro S9 HP w/ 15 facemasks and 30 (30 min) cylinders. \$136,655.00

The local standard as purchased last year by other WPS departments: M&L – 15 Scott SCBA X3PRO w/15 facemasks and 30 (45 min) cylinders. \$ 215,000

Hose:

McKellar will require a capital investment into it's hose inventory of approx. \$10,000 as the hose inventory currently in station is nearing the end of it's lifespan. It is advisable that this be treated in a similar manner to the bunker gear where a commitment going forward to purchase a couple of lengths of hose a year is made after the initial catchup is complete. Cost per length of hose currently:

38mm - \$300 65mm - \$500 100mm - \$900 38mm nozzle - \$800 65mm nozzle - \$900

Bunker Gear

McKellar will be continuing with it's pre arranged schedule of purchasing 2-3 set's of bunker gear per year to meet our commitment to avoid a large purchase such as the one from 2022 from needing to happen again.

3 sets of gear will amount to approx. \$10,000 annually on the operating budget.

Technical Gear

As McKellar becomes certified to perform ICE rescue over the winter coming we will need to replace the 4 Mustang Ice Commander rescue suits which were purchased in 2018 and never used. These suits under NFPA regs have a lifespan of 10 years and therefore will need replacement by 2028.

4 x ICE rescue suits will be approx. \$10,000

Communications:

McKellar's radio system will require an update within the next few years to a digital platform. Every other department within the Mutual Aid Agreement have updated or are in the process of updating to a completely digital platform.

This would involve updating our handheld radio and possibly our vehicular units. A quote to replace 20 radios with digital handsets has been requested from our current area provider. McKellar's Radio tower is functional but antiquated. This radio sit was installed several years ago by the MTO and has had limited attention and upgrades done to it since the township took possession. Given the extremely important nature of this site for everyday Fire communications and Emergency response, as well as the pivotal nature of it's role in the functional response to any emergency within the township, it is recommended that we seek information about renewing and protecting this critical piece of infrastructure. A tower inspection and refurbish starts at approx. \$3500 and involves a full inspection and retensioning of the guidelines and bolts/ brackets which loosen over time and hold it in place.

Total cost for 20 new radios, tower inspection, new antenna - \$38,784

Buildings:

Station 1 is in it's current state functioning very well. Minor cosmetic investment to maintain this hall is recommended over the next 5 years to ensure it retains its positive image to the community.

Station 2 is currently biding time and in need of some roof work to help seal some leaking points which have been noticed over the past few years. It would be recommended to get a quote for the resurfacing of the roof of stn 2 to help it maintain its structural ability. A loose estimate to the cost of a roof refurbishment for the station is \$50,000.

As identified in the Emergency Plan discussions and in the interest of protecting some of the critical infrastructure within the township, the installation of a backup generator is advised. This does not need to be installed at a firehall, though they are main evacuation points for declared emergencies. It could be considered that the works garage would also be an advantageous location to assist in the continuation of work to take place during an emergency at the garage. The most desired outcome would be that both firehalls and the works garage receive the backup units to allow for the functioning of the evacuation centers and alternate EOC's, as well as the works garage.

Approximate cost for 3 installed units - \$70,000 (based on firehall energy draw, works building may require a more robust unit)**Quote was not obtainable in time for this report, cost is approximate.*

As your provincial representative, I take great pride in helping you with your concerns and issues so that you can serve your ratepayers in the best way possible.

Over the past few months, I have heard from some municipalities in Parry Sound District that they are struggling with the septic approval process from the North Bay Mattawa Conservation Authority. They have asked me to look into how septic approvals can be brought into the purview of the municipality to act as a one-stop shop for residents. There are many aspects to consider before leaving the agreement with NBMCA and bringing septic approvals in-house. Another option would be to opt out of the agreement with NBMCA and share a neighbouring municipality's septic services.

I am reaching out to all municipalities who are under the NBMCA for septic approvals to ask if they would like to continue with the status quo or if they would like to be removed and look after septic approvals within the municipality. Please discuss with staff and council and let me know your decision as soon as possible. I will be speaking with Municipal Affairs and Housing about this in the next two weeks.

If there is a desire for change, I would like to deal with the requests as a group rather than one at a time as it will require changes to the Building Code through MMAH.

"Whereas the Canadian livable wage for the Brant—Niagara—Haldimand—Norfolk Region, two years ago was determined to be \$19.80. This was \$6000 above the annual income of a minimum wage employee; and

Whereas County of Brant residents on programs such as Ontario Works, receive targeted fixed monthly incomes of \$733, and ODSP recipients receive \$1376; and

Whereas at the current Ontario minimum wage rate, a person working 37.5 hours per week will earn approximately \$2,500 monthly (before tax); and

Whereas the median rent for one bedroom in the County of Brant as of 2022 was \$1143.90 a month, and the County of Brant does not have current AMR for September 2023; and

Whereas rent is considered affordable, when it is less than 30% of income. In the County of Brant, rent is approximately 156% of Ontario Works, 83.13% of Ontario Disability Support Services, 45% of minimum wage full-time (before tax), and 90% of minimum wage part time; and

Whereas an annual 2.5% allowable rent increase can be combined with an additional 3-6.5% capital investment increase, raising the cost of rental housing another minimum of \$110 monthly; and

Whereas the recent report by the County of Brant Policy Planning and Corporate Strategy departments determined that the County of Brant has serious shortfalls in both affordable and attainable housing supply;

WHEREAS the prevalence of unsanctioned car rally events has grown in recent years throughout North America;

AND WHEREAS the Town of Wasaga Beach has been the target of unsanctioned car rallies over the past four years resulting in property damage, threats to public order, and significant risk to people's safety and enjoyment of their property;

AND WHEREAS the protections afforded by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms are being violated by unsanctioned car rally organizers and participants, thereby infringing on the rights of others and undermined the response of enforcement personnel;

AND WHEREAS unsanctioned car rally activity crosses multiple jurisdictions requiring a province wide coordinated response framework to protect all communities from the same disruption and risk to public safety;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Town of Wasaga Beach requests that a provincial task force be assembled to create a municipal response framework to protect communities from unsanctioned car rallies with a mandate to include, but not limited to:

- Investigate legislative enhancements and tools to assist municipalities in responding and enforcing unsanctioned car rallies.
- Investigate expanded powers for municipal law enforcement officers.
- Develop a proactive approach to awareness, prevention, enforcement and collaboration across all enforcement personnel, including police, municipal law enforcement officers and other provincial offences officers.
- Investigate harsher penalties and increased fines for unsanctioned car rally organizers and participants.

AND FURTHER THAT the Province provide funding to municipalities to assist with the cost in enforcing unsanctioned car rallies;

AND FURTHER THAT a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Right Honourable Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, the Honourable Michael Kerzner, Solicitor General of Ontario, the Honourable Doug Downey, Attorney General of Ontario, the Honourable Paul Calandra, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Honourable Prabmeet Sarkaria, Minister of Transportation, MPP Brian Saunderson, Commissioner of the Ontario Provincial Police, County of Simcoe, FCM, and AMO;

AND FURTHER THAT a copy of this resolution be sent to all Ontario municipalities requesting a letter of support be sent to senior levels of government.

Re: Challenges Faced by Smaller Developers in Ontario Communities

This is to confirm that at the Sept 25, 2023 Council Meeting the following resolution was adopted with respect to the above noted matter:

That, a letter be drafted for signature by the Mayor and that the letter be forwarded to the Minister of Municipal of Affairs, Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) and its member municipalities, outlining the issues and constraints brought to the Township Council's attention with respect to holding back development applications of new homes within the community.

The Township of West Lincoln is writing to bring to your attention a significant matter that has recently come to our attention at the Township of West Lincoln. This issue pertains to the challenges faced by small developers in communities like ours, across the province of Ontario. These challenges are currently making it difficult for communities like West Lincoln to meet the housing goals of the province.

We recently received a request from a developer regarding their development project in Smithville, Ontario which was first draft approved approximately in 2015. The developer has presented a compelling case for an extension to the draft plan of condo approval, citing several noteworthy factors that have emerged since their initial application and which are delaying the start of development. Initially Council wanted to refuse extension approval to force the development but it was clear that would not be possible. The challenges are a symptom of broader issues felt by the Municipality on numerous planning issues, and some of these challenges as outlined to us by the developer, are noted below.

A significant challenge is the current state of the market, characterized by severe material supply chain constraints. These constraints have made it exceedingly difficult for the developer to secure pricing for essential construction materials, introducing financial uncertainty. An extension is deemed necessary to ensure the viability of the project, which aligns with our community's need for diverse housing options.

Furthermore, the recent and unexpected increase in interest rates by the Bank of

Canada has created volatility in the marketplace for pre-sale condo townhomes. These rate hikes have affected both the developer's financing costs and potential buyer's ability to secure financing. An extension would provide the developer with the opportunity to adapt their financial strategies in response to this rapidly changing environment.

Additionally, the challenging market conditions in the Niagara Region, as indicated by the Niagara Association of Realtors, have led to declining home values and shifting market dynamics. These changes necessitate a reassessment of the project timelines, for dwelling types and sizes, to ensure its long-term viability and success. Granting an extension will allow the developer to adapt to these current market dynamics and make informed decisions.

Importantly, extending the draft plan of condo approval would help conserve our Township's valuable resources. Re-submitting the entire approval package and undergoing the approval process again would be resource–intensive for both the developer and our local government. We believe that an extension at this time is a pragmatic solution that aligns with efficient resource utilization.

In light of these challenges, our commitment to supporting responsible and sustainable development in our community, and a desire to help address the identified housing shortfall, we kindly request that AMO and the Provincial government consider the current issues faced by developers in communities across Ontario. The challenges outlined by this developer reflect a broader trend that warrants attention and will severely hamper the ability to achieve increased housing starts if not addressed.

We recommend that the decision-making process for future planning applications be allowed to be guided by a balanced approach that takes into account market conditions, historical precedence, and resource conservation. This approach should ultimately contribute to provide much-needed housing supply to communities like West Lincoln, albeit at slower rates than first contemplated.

We appreciate your attention to this matter and believe that addressing these challenges will help promote equitable development opportunities across the province. Please do not hesitate to reach out if you require any additional information or clarification on this issue.

We look forward to collaborating with AMO and the Provincial government to find solutions that support the growth and vitality of our community and others like it.
